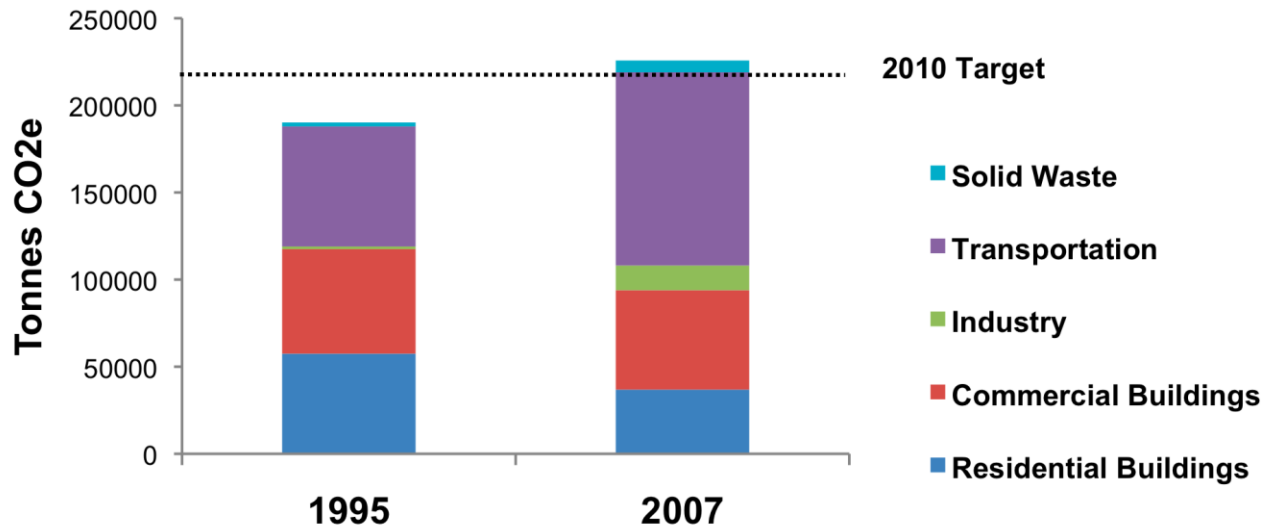


Community Energy Expenditure

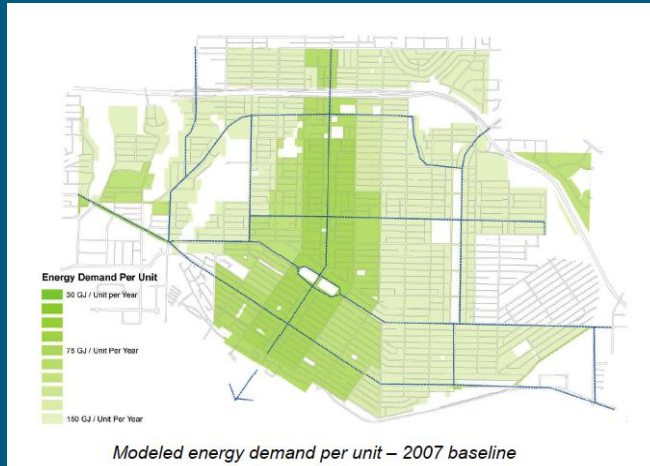

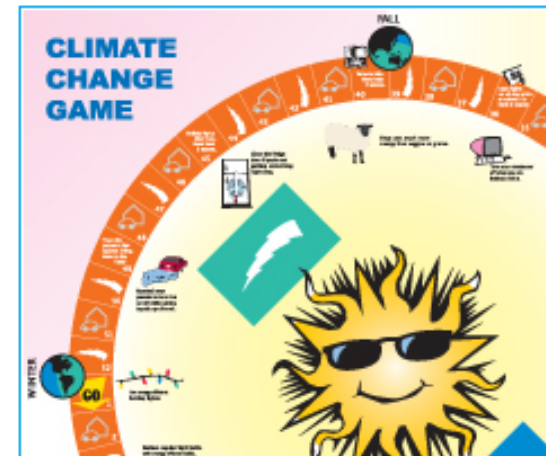
