



Policy Forums

FCM's standing committees will meet during the conference to discuss the work of the past year and set priorities for the coming year. Policy statements will be debated and approved, and a report will be presented at the opening of the resolutions plenary.

Resolutions

Resolutions to be considered at the Annual General Meeting will be included in the 2010 Policy Development Guide and will be available to registered elected officials in the registration area at the conference.

Elections

Please take note that during a meeting held on March 6 of this year, members of the National Board of Directors decided to tighten up the electoral process concerning the FCM Board of Directors and apply the rules as written in the corporation's Statutes and Bylaws.

In short, only those who have transmitted their consent form duly accompanied with a resolution adopted by their municipality before May 8 of this year will appear on the list of candidates. If it is impossible for you to send us these documents before May 8, you may have your name added to the list at the conference before the election of FCM board members. Your name can be included on the list only if you have two aforementioned documents in your possession and hand them over to the returning officer before the elections meeting. This **directive applies to everyone without exception.**





The Nuclear Waste Management Organization (NWMO) was established in 2002 by Ontario Power Generation Inc., Hydro-Québec and New Brunswick Power Corporation in accordance with the *Nuclear Fuel Waste Act (NFWA)* to assume responsibility for the long-term management of Canada's used nuclear fuel.

On June 14, 2007, the Government of Canada selected the NWMO's recommendation for an Adaptive Phased Management approach.

The plan moves towards a goal that Canadians themselves identified: safe and secure long-term containment and isolation of used nuclear fuel produced in Canada, with flexibility for future generations to act in their own best interests.

The NWMO is implementing Adaptive Phased Management collaboratively with Canadians.

A nation can only do as well as its cities and communities. As Canada climbs out of the global economic crisis and enters a tough, post-recession world, it has a chance to lay the foundation for a greener and more prosperous future.

The earthquake that struck Haiti on January 12, 2010, killed hundreds of thousands of people, left more than a million homeless, and caused significant damage to Port-au-Prince, as well as other cities and settlements. After responding to the most immediate humanitarian needs after the crisis, Haiti is now embarking on a plan to rebuild the country into a vibrant, prosperous and resilient democracy.

On March 31, over 150 countries and international organizations, as well as representatives of Haitian civil society, non-governmental organizations, local governments, Haitian Diaspora and the private sector, met at the United Nations in New York to declare their support for Haiti's reconstruction. FCM participated in the official Government of Canada delegation at the meeting, joining our Haitian colleagues in sending a strong message of support from local governments to assist in the reconstruction process.

ROLL OF HONOUR

FCM's Roll Honour pays tribute to FCM officers and officials from member municipalities and municipal associations who have served FCM and municipal government with dedication and distinction. This year's recipients are:

Jean Perrault, Sherbrooke, Que.

FCM's immediate past-president, Jean Perrault, spent 27 years as a municipal politician. He was the mayor of Sherbrooke from 1994 to 2009. Prior to becoming mayor, he served as councillor from 1992 to 1994. He served as a member of numerous committees including environment and urban planning. He was President of the Corporation métropolitaine de transport de Sherbrooke (Sherbrooke Transport Commission) from 1992 to 1994, as well as Vice-President of Conseil régional de développement de l'Estrie (Regional Council of Development of Estrie) for a number of years.



Jean was elected president of the Union des municipalités du Québec (UMQ) in 2005, becoming that organization's 50th president. During his tenure as president of UMQ from November 2005 to April 2008, he signed an innovative new fiscal agreement with the Government of Quebec, with Quebec municipalities to receive \$3.8 billion over seven years.

Jean was active on FCM's National Board of Directors, serving on several standing committees. He was chair of the Quebec Regional Caucus from 2001 to 2005; a member of the Executive Committee from 2005 to 2009; and served as FCM president from June 2008 to June 2009.

Jean has always been concerned with the quality of life and physical fitness of his fellow citizens. He is an accomplished athlete and enjoyed a successful career as a competitor, coach, administrator and organizer in downhill skiing and water-skiing. A former member of the national water-skiing and alpine skiing teams, he competed at four world championships in the 1960s and coached the national waterskiing team at two more world championships in the 1970s.



Anne Johnston, Toronto, Ont.

For more than 25 years, Anne Johnston represented the North Toronto community with energy and passion, serving as Toronto city councillor from 1972 to 1985, 1997 to 2003; and Metro Toronto councillor from 1988 to 1997.

She served on FCM's National Board of Directors from 1986-1987 and served on various standing committees, championing the need for inclusion of a cultural community, until leaving politics in 2003. Anne played a lead role when Toronto hosted FCM's annual conference in 1995, as chair of the conference.

Anne advocated passionately for the preservation of neighbourhoods, for affordable and seniors' housing, for stronger public health programs, for child care services and for improved recreational facilities. The Anne Johnston Health Station, located at Yonge and Eglinton in Toronto, is named in recognition of her tireless work on behalf of seniors and the disabled. She was appointed Toronto's first seniors' advocate, representing the interests and issues of seniors living in Toronto; she co-chaired the first Toronto seniors' assembly, a forum designed to consult and play a pivotal role in identifying issues facing seniors and to propose solutions, taking into account that Toronto's population is becoming more and more multicultural. Anne challenged the city, as a service provider, to take into account these demographic factors—to address the issues of inclusion, equity, equality and dignity—when providing support and services to seniors.

Redeveloping the Waterfront (ST10)

Toronto is a waterfront city. The city's vision for waterfront renewal is a clean, green, beautiful waterfront where people can live, work and play. This goal is taking shape through thoughtful planning and development and guided by innovative policy objectives. An Investing in Prosperity study tour will include a visit to one of the following: a visit to one of the city's unique Business Improvement Areas (BIAs) that demonstrates partnerships with local businesses and reflects the diversity of Toronto; a tour of Exhibition Place and the innovation that occurs when municipalities and the private sector collaborate, resulting in such projects as the first LEED Silver certified conference centre in Canada and the first municipal wind turbine. The 192-acre site is an integral component of Toronto and Ontario's economy, particularly with respect to sport, festivals, recreation, culture and tourism.
